White-glove shifts will run from 9:30 - 1:30 pm, 1:30 - 5:30 pm, and 5:30 - 9:00 pm. Six volunteers are needed for the daytime shifts, and 4 volunteers in the evenings. The dates are Saturday, August 23<sup>rd</sup> through Monday, September 1<sup>st</sup> (Labor Day).

You can choose from the 3 shifts per day, you get free entrance to the fair, and you are free to enjoy the rest of the day eating that great fair food and seeing all the other exhibits. 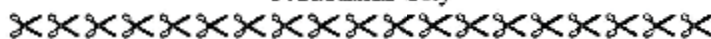

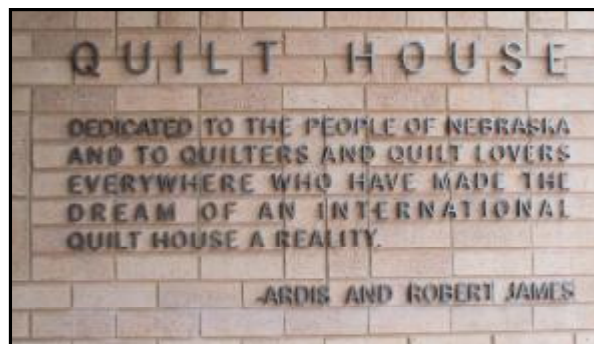

# Fabric As A Narrative - Quilt Depth Reporting @ UNL

We knew the International Quilt Study Center's new building would be opening in spring, 2008, and we thought quilts and quilting would make a good topic for a depth reporting class. What about quilting is international? What makes quilting worthy of academic study? What makes quilting a popular past time today? Those are some of the questions we considered as we embarked on a year-long project that will soon come to fruition with a magazine written, edited and designed by students as well as a student-produced documentary.

To answer the question about the international aspects of quilting, Professor Charlyne Berens and I assigned each student to research quilting traditions on a specific continent. In addition, one of our students was assigned to research quilting in her home country of Japan, and one student looked at Hawaiian quilts. We quickly learned that virtually every continent has a quilting tradition. And, we learned that through war, or trade, or colonialism, many of those traditions are connected.

To get the international perspective, students and faculty traveled in August to England, where we attended the Festival of Quilts 2007 in Birmingham and visited with museum curators in London. Former IQSC advisory board member Bridget Long welcomed our group to her hometown of Ashwell, sharing with us her knowledge of European quilt history and giving us a memorable day in her historic village. As a result of our trip and subsequent research and reporting, the magazine contains seven stories that explore the rich history of quilting around the globe.

In addition, we quickly learned that just as quilting is connected geographically, quilts can connect people, so we tell many of those stories in the magazine as well. As a creative outlet, a means of revenue and a social focal point, quilts have been especially influential in women's lives.

The magazine contains even more stories, including one about the business of quilting, one about passing on the tradition to young quilters, and one about the 1971 exhibit at the Whitney Museum of American Art in New York that people told us over and over was the one event largely responsible for today's current worldwide quilting craze.

The broadcasting students chose to focus on quilting as a means of empowerment for women. Their 30-minute documentary, "Soft Power," includes interviews with quilters from around the world about the various ways in which quilting has brought them strength.

By the time this article is published in June, we expect the magazine, whose working title is "Fabric as a Narrative," to be just a few weeks away from completion.

We would like to recognize Sara Dillow, a founder and past-president of the Nebraska State Quilt Guild, who was our first source in our exploration of the world of quilting. We are saddened that her unexpected death in January means that she will never see the project for which she provided so much impetus. Also, thank you to Carol Kusek, who arranged for some of us to attend Quilt History Day last July and to the IQSC staff who took the time to answer all of our questions and provide their valuable insight and expertise. Our project would not have been possible without all of the passionate, generous quilters we met along the way.

## NEBRASKA STATE QUILT GUILD - Condensed Minutes Board and Committees - April 19, 2008 - Quilter's Cottage, Kearney, NE

Bea Bauerle, 2008 President, called the meeting to order at 9:28 am. Sheila Beins passed out information packets for the meeting.

**SECRETARY'S REPORT:** Minutes of the previous meeting were approved via email.

**TREASURER'S REPORT:** Sheila Beins reported for Treasurer Susan Seidel. First quarter 2008 income is \$ 28,174.12; expenses are (\$ 21,948.09); net income is \$ 6,226.03. QNE 08 was advanced \$ 5,000.00 to offset teacher transportation costs. Total 1<sup>st</sup> quarter NSQG assets, including CD's, is \$ 71,075.70. The 2008 first quarter sub-total for the Quilt Study Fund is \$ 20,139.48, bringing the pledge balance to \$ 100,883.54. Board and committee chairs were reminded to submit vouchers for mileage and other expenses.

**\*Nancy Shavlik moved the Board approve the Treasurer's report. Lois Wilson seconded – motion carried.**

### **DISTRICT DIRECTOR'S REPORTS:**

**Region I:** Lois Wilson reported that plans are being made for a possible summer or fall event. **Region II:** Nancy Shavlik updated information on the quilt gathering in Neligh Friday, April 25, 2008. Nancy Shavlik and Carol Kusek have presented Discover NE programs in the area with more scheduled. **Region III:** Barb Hinrichs and LeeAnn Meduna reported that NSQG will co-sponsor the Piecemakers Spring Luncheon and Guest Day in McCook, NE, May 2<sup>nd</sup>, and the Spring Fling II Retreat in Curtis, NE, May 16<sup>th</sup> – 18<sup>th</sup> by providing up to \$ 100.00 for each event.

**International Quilt Study Center:** Fay Kliever attended the opening of the IQSC March 30, 2008, on behalf of Bea Bauerle. The event(s) were well attended and the center received publicity in several national publications. Four hundred people attended the dedication Friday morning and 1600 toured the facility on Sunday. The Nancy Crow lecture was standing room only.

### **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

**Quilt Nebraska 08:** Cindy Scheinost and Sandy Hanson showed the QNE 08 registration booklet. 713 copies were mailed. The cost to publish was \$1.96 per booklet due to special arrangements made by Cindy Scheinost and donated labor. Mailing costs were \$277.13 using a non-profit bulk mail permit. Due to variables in bulk mail procedures/use of non-profit permits, printing costs, and labor considerations, the QNE 08 committee strongly suggests that hard copy printing and mailing of the registration booklets be discontinued and instead be web based saving money, labor, printing supplies, and time. The committee was congratulated for their hard work and effort to produce and distribute the booklet.

**Quilt Nebraska 09:** Merikay Gengenbach reported from Carol Brandl updates on QNE 09. Volunteers to assist are LeAnn Frobom, Bobbie Watton and Leola Kahl. National teachers have been contacted. A contact has been made with the Lincoln Visitors Bureau to arrange additional activities. Merikay Gengenbach has contacted the Cornhusker Marriott and

reduced the number of rooms reserved by the 10% allowed due to decreased membership. Carol requested help to find a speaker for the quilt history day - any ideas or suggested should be forwarded to her.

**Awards:** Members were reminded the nomination form deadline is prior to April 30<sup>th</sup>.

**Bylaws and Policies:** Beryl Knotwell has all the past information and will add the newsletter committee.

**Education:** An education presentation is scheduled at Threads Across Nebraska.

**Historian:** Beth Guth asked that articles, photos, etc., of events be sent to her, especially information on the grand opening of the IQSC.

**Library:** The book, "Posterize It!", has been distributed to 292 public libraries in Nebraska. Cost of the books, distribution and admin expense is \$ 3,127.09.

**Marketing:** Sandy Anderson reviewed suggestions from the NSQG website query for marketing ideas. She has contacted several suppliers for costs. She shared information on <http://www.cafepress.com>, a supplier and direct order online opportunity. Sandy was instructed to continue investigating the services of this company and contact Chris Wiegars if it would be possible to link to their site from the NSQG website. Past "left over" marketing items will be sold during the silent auction at QNE 08. Two thousand dollars (\$ 2000.00) is budgeted for marketing if items need to be purchased for sale.

**Membership:** Darice Cecil reported current membership at 746 members, not including 6 complimentary memberships. 248 members from 2007 have not renewed. The newsletter has been sent electronically to those who requested that format. Failed delivery returns are investigated and resolved if possible. A new program to better compress the file for electronic delivery is in use.

**Newsletter:** The June edition will be delivered only as an electronic version to those requesting it. Electronic delivery will continue to reduce the number of printed copies. Suggestions for articles or feedback should be directed to Betz McMahon. It was noted that to maintain a high quality print copy the web version may be less crisp due to design variances.

**Raffle Quilt:** There are 1,660 tickets left to sell. The quilt is scheduled for display at Neligh, McCook, Curtis, Lincoln, Omaha, Red Cloud, and Nebraska Days in North Platte. Those wanting to display the quilt should contact Darice at 2625 Rathbone Road, Lincoln, NE, 402-476-9124, or [dcecil@neb.rr.com](mailto:dcecil@neb.rr.com).

**Quilt Nebraska Site Selection:** Sheila Beins reported for the committee that they have received information from the Omaha Holiday Inn on 72<sup>nd</sup> Street, the new Embassy Suites at 144<sup>th</sup> in Omaha, Midlands College at Fremont, and the Double Tree in Omaha for QNE 2012. The committee will work with Bea Bauerle, Merikay Gengenbach, and the QNE 2012 chairman for guidance.

**Nebraska State Fair:** Sheila Green and Janice Lippincott have agreed to chair

the NE State Fair committee. Bonnie Kucera and Katie Wilson will head the white-glovers committee. Volunteers (individuals and/or guild groups) will be needed as day captains, white-glovers, and to help hang up and take down the quilts.

**"Threads Across Nebraska":** Fay Kliever reported they have contacted 40 vendors. Brochures have been distributed. The NSQG booth will be featured in the education, membership, marketing, and new NSQG raffle quilt area. A new chairman is needed for 2009.

**IQSC Pledge Fund Committee:** Sandi Kosch reported that the shirt project would end May 1, 2008. The new promotion is a onetime offer of Gingher scissors. The order form is in the QNE 08 registration booklet and ordered scissors will be delivered at QNE. Proceeds from the QNE silent and live auctions go to the fund.

**Website:** No report.

**Surfin Stitchers:** No report.

**UNFINISHED BUSINESS:** Merikay Gengenbach read the committee description for the State Fair committee: to coordinate the State Fair Quilt Show and work with the Fair Board. Appoint sub-chairs to oversee hanging, staffing, organizational duties, documentation, and take down. Bea Bauerle requested that Chadron QNE 08 attendees have the opportunity to donate money to the Sara Dillow Memorial. The funds collected would be presented through the NSQG to the IQSC.

**NEW BUSINESS:** Jan Sears requested a discussion on the possibility of NSQG offering one QNE 09 Registration/Convention package as a raffle.

**\*Barb Hinrichs moved that NSQG offer one 2009 Quilt Nebraska (QNE 09) registration/convention package at QNE 08 as a raffle item with proceeds going to the International Quilt Study Center Pledge Fund. Lois Wilson seconded – motion carried.**

**Nominating Committee:** Nominating committee members are Sheila Green, Barb Hinrichs, Susan Seidel, and Merikay Gengenbach. **\*Barb Hinrichs moved to approve UNL Library Services to digitize and post available archived Nebraska State Quilt Guild newsletters. LeeAnn Meduna seconded – motion carried.**

Our **Discover Nebraska** discussion continues with this third installment (in a series of six). For more information, go to our website [www.DiscoverNebraska.org](http://www.DiscoverNebraska.org).

Education was very important to the pioneers, just like it is today. **School houses** were built as soon as possible as a community project. One-room schools had just one teacher for all grade levels, usually 5 years old through grade eight. Cooperation among the students was common-place, as the older ones helped the younger students. Red was the traditional color of schools.



The **Church** was also one of the first buildings built as a community project. Worship and religious freedom were an important part of the pioneer's lives. The denomination of the first church in a community often reflects their cultural origin. For instance, the first church in Lincoln was a Methodist Church, with many of our first residents coming from England.

The **Windmill** was used by ranchers and farmers for irrigation of the crops and water for themselves and their animals. The action of the windmill's blades pumps water from underground to the surface. Ground water is a precious natural resource. The Ogallala Aquifer is a porous rock bed under 59% of Nebraska (more than any other State). If you were to "capture" all that water in a gigantic pitcher and poured it over the State of Nebraska, it would be over 37.9' deep! The **Nebraska Windmill Block** was designed by Bud Dunklaw of Lincoln in 1977. The Lincoln Quilters Guild held a contest to design a quilt block that would depict the State of Nebraska. It was adopted as the official quilt block of the State of Nebraska. Look closely. It's the "Nebraska" windmill because the fans of the windmill are the shape (or mirror image) of Nebraska. Lake McConaughy near Ogallala is Nebraska's largest lake. Lake McConaughy is more than twelve miles long! To be continued.....
